## Operation Long Swamp

On Saturday March 10th , members of the Greenlawn American Legion along with other volunteers from the community, began to reclaim the centuries old Long Swamp Cemetery in Huntington Station from the ravages of time and vandalism. The cemetery, which contains the remains of three veterans of the American Revolution, is among dozens of small and largely forgotten burial grounds from Huntington's distant past.

On March 2nd, at the urging of Town Historian Robert Hughes, a work crew from the Town of Huntington began clearing thorn bushes, trees and debris from the approach to the actual burying space at the top of the hill. A large tree which had fallen from an adjacent property onto the west fence was cut up and removed. This made it possible for our volunteers to concentrate on the burial area itself, since no heavy equipment could be brought into that space. It also provided a clear line of site from the roadway on Barker's Lane, in hopes of discouraging local youths from using the cemetery as a hangout.

Our crew still had much ahead of them, but after three hours of intense work, we completely changed the look of this historic cemetery, even uncovering some previously unseen grave stones that had been covered over with soil for many years. Mrs. Mary Lehman who lives next door, came by to pitch in, and solved the mystery of who had been placing flags each Memorial Day on the graves of the three Minutemen buried there. It was she. And she had been weeding their gravesites as well for the past several years. Town of Huntington Historian Robert Hughes who supervised our work in the sensitive graves area now has a treasure trove of new grave stones to

investigate and possibly repair. Many thanks go to Legionnaires Donna Boyle, Ed Hayde, Earl Emmons, Dennis Madden, Carlo Giordano, Rich Klein, Brian Bilyk, and Son Brian Madden for their help. I apologize if I left anyone out. There were people coming and going all morning. Also Legionnaire Walter Scally of Huntington Post 360 was there to lend a hand. Kevin DeFrist of Jacobson's Funeral Home was on hand with his chain saw and of course, Scout Leader Maura Barth and the girls of Troop 3733 did a wonderful job.

### Oratorical Winner from Pius V in Melville

Caitlin Kennedy, a twelfth grader at Pius V School, Melville, came in first place on March 3<sup>rd</sup>, in the American Legion Department of New York Oratorical Contest in Albany. She will be a finalist in the National Finals American Legion Oratorical Contest in Indianapolis.

Ms. Kennedy was sponsored by American Legion Greenlawn Post 1244 and has won the Suffolk County, 10<sup>th</sup> District and Zone 2 contests on her way to taking top honors in the Albany contest.

The American Legion Oratorical Contest exists to develop deeper knowledge and appreciation for the U.S. Constitution among high school students. Since 1938, the program has presented participants with an academic speaking challenge that teaches important leadership qualities, the history of our nation's laws, the ability to think and speak clearly, and an understanding of the duties, responsibilities, rights and privileges of American citizenship. The program has fea-

tured numerous politicians and prominent contestants over the years, including former president candidate Alan Keyes and CNN anchor Lou Dobbs.

The national finals contest will be April 13-15, 2012, at the University Place Conference Center & Hotel, 850 W. Michigan St., Indianapolis. Quarterfinal and semifinal contests will be Saturday, April 14. The championship contest will be Sunday, April 15.

### Missing In America Project (MIAP)

This past quarter has seen an increase in activity in all areas. MOVA, (Mayor's Office of Veterans Affairs) has been busy as usual. The death of indigent veterans has no regard for humanity's wishes, or concerns . We have had three burials of indigent veterans from New York City at Calverton National Cemetery this year already.



As the Suffolk County American Legion and Greenlawn Post chair for MIAP, I have been in partnership with the Nassau-Suffolk Funeral Directors Association (NSFDA) in locating and verifying the abandon cremated remains of veterans in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. I have been assisted in this endeavor by American Legionnaires Earl Emmons and Bill Ness.

Approximately ninety Funeral Homes have been contacted by us, sometimes several times. Our volunteers are dedicated members of the American Legion, and my hat is off to them. Out of the ninety telephone calls the team has made, they have been able to garner twenty one abandoned, cremated remains. Hopefully, more veterans remains will be located, through our extended efforts. As of press time, interment details are still being worked out.

We also have a team of American Legion comrades working upstate on MIAP missions and have three sets of cremated remains ready for interment in the spring of this year. The Missing in America Project is a national organization; consequently I have been tasked with missions out of state as well.

At present, I am also working on five more sets of cremated remains awaiting interment in New Jersey. I am the Missing in America Project Chair for Post 1244 in Greenlawn, as well as the American Legion Suffolk County Chair . I am also New York State MIAP Coordinator, an MIAP National Representative and a member of the National Board of Directors for the Missing in America Project.

### Girl Scouts “Honor Veterans” Project Improves Greenlawn Memorial

On Wednesday, February 8<sup>th</sup>, four members of Girl Scout Troop 3733 addressed our members and described what they have been doing as part of their “Silver Award,” a community service project geared toward the local community.

Their project, called “Honoring Veterans” involved more than 50 hours of volunteer time per Girl Scout, or over 200 hours over the past twelve months. The Silver Team Members are Maeve Barth-Dwyer, Alexa Forberg, Jessica Mahoney and Erin Waldin.

For their project, they chose to honor the men and women who have served our country through military service. Part of their project was to spruce up the Greenlawn Memorial Park at Broadway and Pulaski Road. This is what they accomplished:

- \* Planted decorative grasses, trimmed all of the hedges around the monuments, mulched and weeded every where.
- \* Created an oval flowerbed under a tree just behind the monuments. And trimmed the existing bushes that obscured the Park’s sign. Planted mums in the front near the sign and also around the decorative grasses to make it look great in October and November and planted King pansies under the bushes in October – to add color to the newly uncovered area. Planted daffodil bulbs around two of the centrally located garbage bins to add color in the spring and summer months.
- \* Power washed the central plaza – to wash away all of the dirt and grime on the concrete.
- \* In the late March and April, they will be: Power washing the actual walkways that come out of the central round area, weed again and prepare area for new plantings, re-mulch flower beds to freshen them up. They will then plant perennials in the new oval-shaped flower bed under the tree to create a new Spring/Summer display. Planting new brightly colored plants under the hedges and around the park’s sign.

Some other aspects of the scouts project are: Visiting the Northport VA Hospital, arranging Friday “Game Nights,” making and delivering Veterans Day and Valentines Day cards for the residents at the VA. In March, they will be sponsoring a personal –care products drive for the Veterans. They manned the water station at the Big 8 Field of Honor Run in October. Assembled, placed, removed and folded the American Flags at the Field of Honor at Town Hall.

And finally they purchased a flag in honor of Larry Stevens a Vietnam Vet who was KIA. They will be carrying that flag in the upcoming Memorial Day Parade. A beautiful tribute.

We applaud and very much appreciate their accomplishments!

# "You Earned It"

## FYI VIETNAM VETERANS

Vietnam Veterans and other U.S. Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange or other herbicides during military service may be eligible for:

- Agent Orange Registry health exam
- Health care benefits
- Disability compensation

Surviving spouses, dependent children and dependent parents of Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange or other herbicides during military service and died as the result of diseases related to the exposure may be eligible for survivors' benefits.

In October 2009, the VA announced that three new conditions would be added to the list of diseases presumptively associated with exposure to certain herbicide agents: hairy cell and other B-cell leukemia's, Parkinson's disease, and ischemic heart disease.

Below are additional Presumptive Diseases associated with Agent Orange Exposure:

AL Amyloidosis	Parkinson's Disease
Chronic B-Cell Leukemia	Acute (and Sub acute Peripheral Neuropathy)
Chloracne (or similar acne-form disease.	Porphyria Cutanea Tarda
Diabetes Mellitus Type 2	Prostate Cancer
Hodgkin's Disease	Respiratory Cancers
Ischemic Heart Disease	Soft Tissue Sarcomas
Multiple Myeloma	Children with Birth Defects
Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma

For over 70 years, Boys State has been functioning as a truly well kept secret, while providing a program of exceptional educational value. Boys State is a Leadership Action Program designed for male high school juniors to participate in a practical government course designed to help them develop a working knowledge of the structure of government and an understanding that their government is nothing more than what they make it.

Our Post has been actively participating in this program for the past few years, annually sending two delegates. It is a one week program that takes place late in June, after the school year ends, and is held at SUNY, in Morrisville; however, the actual selection process begins much earlier. In January, the principal and faculty of Harborfields High School, in Greenlawn, present us with a list of potential

candidates from the junior class. Legionnaire Ed O'Shea and I then interview each candidate on an individual basis, asking a series of relevant questions that will help us to make the best selection. In order to get an additional perspective, for the past two years we have had participants from the previous years program join us in the interview process and give us their input which we weigh into our decision. This year we had the help of Alex Kazerouni who provided some very helpful observations.

Ed O'Shea said, "My opportunities to interview candidates for the Boys State program over the past few years have restored my confidence in our youth. The values, knowledge, leadership skills and confidence of all the candidates have given me new hope for the future of our republic".

This year we will be sending four boys to the Boys State program for the first time. This is due to the financial support we have received from local Greenlawn merchants. A few months ago, Ed and I spent a number of days soliciting this support by visiting each of these businesses. Their generosity is gratefully appreciated and has allowed us to expand the program enabling additional boys to be part of this great opportunity.

Harborfields High School Principal, Dr. Dave Bennardo said, "We feel so very fortunate to share such a strong partnership with your Post. The opportunities that you have provided our students through the Boys State program have been priceless. It is thrilling to watch some of our finest young men exposed to the important lessons of citizenship, civic pride, and patriotism. We look forward to a long, healthy friendship with our friends from the American Legion."

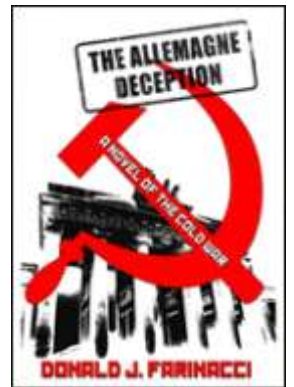
