What's New In 2022?

Veterans receiving VA disability compensation are set to see their monthly VA pay increase by **5.9% in 2022**. This is the largest increase in over a decade! To put that in dollars, for every \$1,000 a veteran currently receives in benefit payments, they will see an additional \$59 in 2022. The same formula applies for Social Security payments.

The VA also plans to work hard in 2022 to overhaul their electronic medical records system and has turned over a completely new leadership team designed to avoid the implementation problems they have encountered in the past. The implementation is still on schedule to be completed in 2028, and the overhaul will benefit veterans by consolidating veteran medical files with active-duty files into the same computer system - for the first time!

The future is conquered by those who believe in themselves and the beauty of their dreams. Start the new year 2022 on a wonderful note! A new year is the perfect window of opportunity to rejoice the things you have in life and prepare yourself for upcoming challenges. May this year come with lots of laughter and an abundance of blessings.

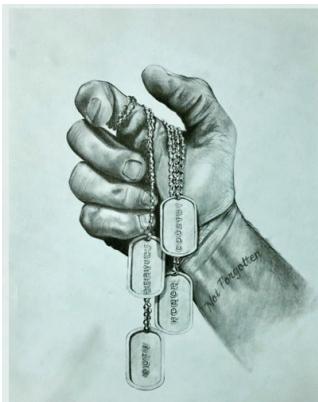
In the past, a party was held and age-appropriate gifts were handed out by "Santa" to the children. This has had to be altered due to the pandemic.

First Person

Vinnie Crimauado, USS Norris DD859

I was drafted for military service in August, 1945. Upon completion of my physicals, I was to be sent to Fort Dix for Army service. I requested a deferment to complete high school in December 1945. In mid-December I went to the Naval Recruitment Office and joined the Navy, as I wanted no part of Army life.

I left for basic training in January 1946 at Camp Peary, VA. Upon arrival, I noticed many POW soldiers around the base. They were German prisoners waiting to be returned to Germany. Camp Peary was a POW camp as well as a naval training base. I completed basic training and was shipped to Treasure Island, San Francisco for further orders in April 1946. Near the end of April, two troop transports arrived and loaded up with officers, Navy, Marines and Army personnel for transport to the Far East.

We arrived at Tsingtao, China in early May and docked at the pier for dis-embarkment. I could see from the pier the complete devastation of the city – roads gone, buildings leveled and people in serious condition. At the end of the pier was a large canvas on the ground and food was being dumped there from the ships. Many Chinese people were scavenging for the food left there. It was a horrible sight to see as a young man to see the starvation of humanity.

As the Army personnel were coming off the ships, they were being sent to various bases to relieve the troops who were going home. The harbor was full of ships as this was Admiral Halsey's 3rd Fleet. The Navy personnel were being sent to various ships. We were also relieving the sailors who were going home.

Long Swamp Historic Cemetery - Our Brothers Keepers

We were husbands, fathers, sons and friends. We were farmers, millers and wrights. By our sides - the wives, mothers and daughters who shared in our dreams and hopes.

We were men of the First Regiment of the Huntington militia: Sergeant John Carll, whose brothers Captain Timothy and Platt Carll served in the First Regiment and Private Scudder Carll, a cousin. A family friend, Private Joseph Ireland, who in 1776 at the age of sixty two put aside his wife, ten children and grandchildren too numerous to count, joined us in our ranks. We were Minutemen, trained to deploy when duty called. At the end of the Revolutionary War, the memory of their names, service, and sacrifices slipped quietly from the hearts and minds of those who owe them a debt of gratitude.

Ten years ago, a man strolling near his home in Huntington Station came across a broken, rusting cyclone fence. From the gate, a graffiti covered hunter green sign dangled: "Huntington Historical Cemetery." A morass of rotting leaves lead to a knoll of briars and brambles growing over fallen limbs and trees. He ventured up and at the top his eye was drawn to a shard of tattered red, white and blue among the brown branches and fallen leaves. As he looked around he saw two similar markers that had been left behind. Beside each marker laid a broken and faded limestone marker.

Private Ireland and the Carlls had never really been lost in the cemetery known as the Long Swamp but now they were found.

The man who rediscovered them was a veteran from American Legion Post 1244 of Greenlawn. The area around them was carefully cleared and the Post began tending to their brothers in arms. The area of the cleanup expanded as the broken markers of wives and children slowly surfaced from the decades of neglect. Soon the veterans were joined by students, boy scouts, volunteers from the community and the town government, as the encroaching overgrowth was pushed back. The men of the Huntington Militia were now receiving their overdue recognition and acclaim as the sun shined down upon them.

General Douglas MacArthur said, "Old soldiers never die; they just fade away." It is our duty to make sure that on Veterans Day, Memorial Day, D-Day, Pearl Harbor Day and every day, that the valor and honor of our troops here and abroad, present and past, living and dead who provide us with the light and freedom that we bask in, never fade in the hearts and minds of all.

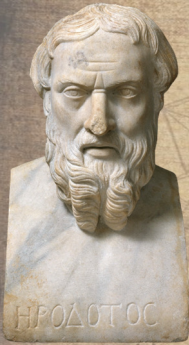

The Post 1244 Historian



Our Post was chartered in March, 1943 and was composed largely of World War I veterans. We do know that our first commander was George Washington Richardson, who was awarded a Purple Heart for wounds suffered in that war.

Cmdr, Richardson is buried at Long Island national Cemetery Prior to being chartered, the Post held elections in October 1942 and elected their first officers:

George Richardson, Commander; Arthur B. Carson, 1st Vice Commander; Herbert Addams, 2nd Vice Commander; Louis Presley, 3rd Vice Commander; Oscar J. Anderson, Treasurer; Clyde W. Funderburk, Adjutant; Arthur Quinn, Sgt.-at Arms; Fredrick Plank, Chaplain and Harry Holden, County representative.

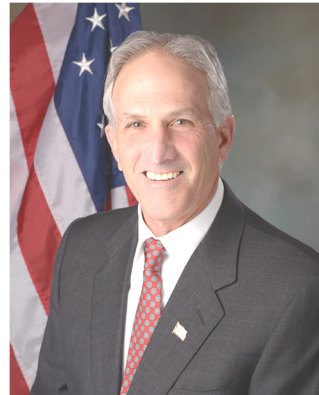

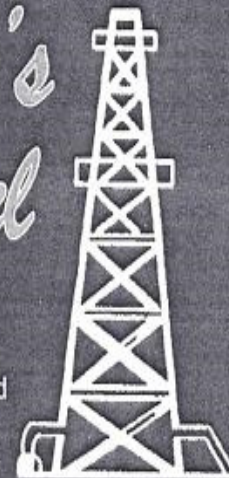

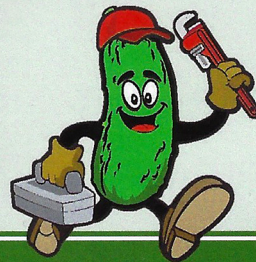
