A Rededication for a Civil War Veteran On June 22, 2013, in a magnificent

ceremony conducted by Missing In America Project and American Legion Post 1244, 42 Veterans and spouses of Veterans were interred at Long Island National Cemetery. Their ashes were placed in the newly erected Columbaria. Two of those Veterans fought in the Civil War and had waited nearly a hundred years for someone to discover and acknowledge them. The respect and honor due them would come as a matter of the covenant they made with the Grand Army of the Potomac. This was done with all due ceremony at the time. Both of these Civil War soldiers were members of the Garibaldi Guards.

Several months later, our Jewish genealogist Leonard Holtz, who is also a cantor, discovered, in his research, that Lt. Emanuel Lederer, one of those Civil War Veterans, was Jewish.

MIAP, with the able support of American Legion Post 1244 and our ever resourceful Leonard Holtz, had their hands on the reins, and come what may, this team would handle it, come rain or shine.

The Missing in America Project planned a rededication for Lt. Lederer. M.I.A.P. would see that our veteran was interred with a proper Jewish service. Leonard Holtz continued to research Lt. Lederer's roots and our genealogist, Ms. Ann Marie Martin, went in search of any living relatives. M.I.A.P.'s volunteer Rabbi Michael Trachtenberg was notified, and as always, stepped up. The Jewish Veteran groups, as well as the American Legion, were notified. The appointed day arrived. The tent was up, the chairs were out, and the podium with table was in its proper place.

Ms. Martin and Mr. Holz had located Lt. Lederer's great granddaughter, Ms. Jean Narversen and greatgrandson, Mr. Roderick Wallace. This was a magnificent piece of genealogical work. To record the ceremony, retired Post Commander Bob Santo and Sean Verma of MIAP took videos and photos. Mr. Verma came up from Virginia to do the photo shoot. Behind the podium stood three reenactors from the 39th New York

Infantry Regiment of the Garibaldi Guards in full uniform. The ceremony began with my introduction. Suddenly, a flight of WWII A-6 Texan trainers arrived overhead, by coincidence, with a rousing fly-over. Rabbi Trachtenberg then began the Jewish ritual with the stirring "El Male Rachamim" in English. It is a prayer of comfort about the soul ascending to the Garden of Eden or Paradise.

Mr. Holtz went on with a very interesting historic eulogy that captured the era of Lt. Lederer's war time experience. Next Mr. Roderick Wallace, great-grandson of Lt. Lederer spoke of his great-grandfather with reverence and love. Mr. Wallace also mentioned the descendants of Lt. Lederer and their accomplishments.

Rabbi Trachtenberg then gave a recital of the "Kaddish" in Hebrew. All the Jewish veterans stood and recited it with the Rabbi. For a brief moment in time we were transported to another time and place in the dim past. I then recited the poem "I am a Veteran", written by Rabbi Swerdlow, the Northport Medical Center's Chaplain.

The last act to be fulfilled was the opening of Lt. Lederer's niche and place a small bag of soil from Israel to accompany Lt. Lederer for eternity.

A closing thought for us to ponder concerning the players of this story is the fact that we had three greatgrandchildren of the Civil War Garibaldi Guards assembled in one place at one time. They represented two Civil War soldiers from the same outfit, who served at the same time. Jean Narversen, Roderick Wallace, great-grandchildren of Lt. Emanuel Lederer and Leonard Holtz, great-grandson of Herman Holtz. Almost a hundred years went by, while these Veterans patiently waited for their eternal peace.

Mr. Leonard Noble was an Army Veteran who served in Viet Nam. He

also was homeless.

It turned out to be another back-log day at the cemetery because of the past few days of inclement weather, once again, in that northeast leg of Long Island, the North Fork. On the way out to the cemetery we passed a funeral procession over a mile long. It was cold, raw, and windy, and our group had to wait for the honor guard to finish with the funerals before us. No one complained. Everyone stood their ground patiently waiting for our service to begin. The wind whipped through the funeral pavilion ravaging all who stood in it's way. There is no other way to say it. Calverton National Cemetery is located in the coldest part of Long Island at this time of the year. This part of the Island has the most open land available, therefore the best place for expansion of the cemetery. This is the only National Cemetery on Long Island that can accept full remains. Long Island National Cemetery is now full.

When we bury two to four abandoned veterans a month this time of the year, we must endure the commute, and the weather. Funerals of abandoned veterans are always thought provoking, Where would they be if it were not for organizations like M.I.A.P? Who would speak for them? Who would stand up and honor them? For now these questions are answered, but who can we count on tomorrow? Let there always be a Missing in America project for all our Veteran's tomorrows.

Sail Ahead: Healing Wounded Veterans Through Sailing

On June 26th, at least 8 Veterans and staff of the Northport VA Medical Center will set sail on the waters of Oyster Bay and Long Island Sound, courtesy of the Duclay family and their "**Sail Ahead**" program. At least 6 sailboats will be ready to take them on a four hour sailing adventure. This will be their first outing with the VA, and surely will not be the last.

Since 2013, Brothers Kilian Duclay and Sean Duclay, with the enthusiastic support of their family, friends and Oakcliff Sailing Center, have dedicated themselves and their expertise in sailing to provide effective therapy for traumatized American veterans. From comfortable day long trips in the summer to intense racing in harsh freezing cold conditions in the winter, sailing brings mental relief to our veterans.

The immersion into an environment where everybody's work counts and a collective will is applied to survive has two effects: while it cleanses the mind it also shows that expertise developed in combat can be applied with success towards competitive sailing.

Even though at times it can be seen as extreme, this sailing activity is not dangerous! Taking veterans sailing provides an often new and definitively liberating experience. Veterans are exposed to new sounds, new feelings, new or renewed social interaction and new kinds of challenges. Learning to sail and being supported by others while on a sailboat in the middle of the ocean exposes our veterans to positive and constructive stress. It forces each veteran to work with other unfamiliar veterans to make a team that gets the boat moving! The veterans returning from sailing trips are energized, eager to return and relish the mental freedom intense sailing provides.

The therapy is similar in concept to veterans going to work with horses or being exposed to stressful environment where they can show success.

Simply put, sailing is positively one of the best therapies for many.

We will be looking for volunteers to assist in these outings and veterans who can benefit from the experience.

On Saturday, August 22nd, Sail Ahead will conduct its very first annual event named "Let's Take A Veteran Sailing," The plan is to recruit as many sailboats and veterans as we can and team them up to sail on the Sound that day. We hope for a large turnout of boats and veterans. An all Women Veteran outing is in the planning stage as well.

We will be updating you on the details of these and other events as they are finalized.

Greenlawn ALR to Make Pony Express 'Donation Run' to Baltimore, Aug. 23-26

Since January 1, 2015 ALR Post 1244 has completed more than 65 Veteran Missions thanks to the unconditional commitment to serve Veteran needs as exemplified by the tireless efforts of the

ALR Executive Board and Riders.

Memorial Day found 20 Riders strong completing four (4) missions in just one day: Fundraiser; 2 Parades; and Bald Hill Reading of The Names. The spirit to serve veterans is contagious, and each week finds ALR traveling to additional venues participating in multiple missions serving our veteran community. Many missions require the ALR travel at its own expense to Calverton & LI National Cemeteries and to witness the agony and emotional suffering of the families paying last respects for their beloved heroes. Silently we stand tall to honor his/ her service with the same reserved strength and courage our Veterans demonstrated each day of service to keep freedom free......"Greater love hath no man than this; that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13)Amen. Freedom is so very expensive. May God bring comfort and solace to every Gold Star Mother, Father, and each Sibling. As an unfortunate consequence

of Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, and the global war on terror, many children of our active-duty military personnel are now members of single-parent families. We, the American Legion Riders, are raising scholarship funds to ensure that higher education will be a reality for these families. But we need your help.

It is estimated that over 11,000 children have lost a parent in the wars overseas. That number continues to grow each day. The Legion is actively working to ensure that all those children who want a post-secondary education will be provided one. **Just how much is needed to be raised?** Obviously, the more money the fund has, the more interest it will accrue for scholarships. If there was enough money in the principal, full college scholarships could be awarded each year. Unfortunately, that day is far off. It is thought that eventually a minimum of \$20 million will be needed to meet the expected need for scholarships. After donations are tallied, \$6.5 million may be funded by year's end 2015....maybe!?

route for the 2015 American Legion Legacy Run, a fundraiser for the American Legion Legacy Scholarship.

The American Legion Legacy Run will travel the open roads and highways along some of the most scenic areas of the United States. Portions will include the Ohio River, historic towns and cities, farmlands, two-lane roads and interstate, and beautiful plains, hills and rivers of Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Maryland. Highlights of Legacy Run 2015 include shorter days, shorter legs, several stops at military and veteran memorials, wreath laying ceremonies (each day), meals at American Legion posts, a return visit to Stoystown, PA and the Flight 93 Memorial, and a three-hour layover at Gettysburg National Battlefield.

On Memorial Day, American Legion Riders Post 1244 set up a fund raising tent at the Dunkin Donuts in Greenlawn and raised \$500 to be donated to the American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund. Another generous \$500 in matching funds was donated by Post 1244 and raised the ALR scholarship fund to \$1000. These funds will be delivered via a "Pony Express" donation run to Baltimore August 23-26. Honorable mention with deep appreciation and sincere thankfulness goes out to our generous supporters, loyal Greenlawn residents and Post 1244, a community at-large, who are always mindful of veteran's issues.

In 2014, the 96th Annual American Legion National Convention raised a record \$1 million for the Legacy Fund. We hope to exceed that amount this year!

Nine annual Legacy Runs have now raised a total of \$5 million for the American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund.

A three rifle volley, echo taps and the Chaplain's benediction followed.

It was a fine ceremony of remembrance and gratitude for those who gave their lives so that we can continue to celebrate our Memorial Day each year.

Veterans Discounts



"What are my benefits?" As a Suffolk County Veteran Service Officer, I hear this question almost daily. Although this question is very broad it is a very valid question for some veterans. The

most simple answer to this question is that being a veteran in this nation is a benefit in itself. Having had the opportunity to serve your country honorably deserves many entitlements. The question that should be asked is: How can my benefits fit into my lifestyle? Below are a few agencies that issue a discount card in New York State.

Lifetime Liberty Pass

The Lifetime Liberty Pass permits qualified New York State veterans with disabilities discounted use of state parks, historic sites, and recreational facilities operated by the Office Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (State Parks) and the state Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC). Once issued, the Lifetime Liberty Pass will never have to be renewed!

The Lifetime Liberty Pass benefits includes free vehicle entry to state parks and DEC-operated day-use areas, as well as numerous state boat launch sites, historic sites, arboretums and park preserves; free golf at 28 State Park golf courses; free swimming pool entrance at 36 State Park pools, and discounted camping and cabin rentals at all 119 State Park and DEC campgrounds. To qualify for the pass, the veteran must be a resident of New York State and provide State Parks with written certification from the United States Veterans Administration or the New York State Division of Veterans Affairs that the applicant is a war veteran with a 40% or greater service connected disability as certified by the United States Veterans Administration, or who has at any time been awarded by the Federal government an allowance towards the purchase of an automobile or who is eligible for such an award.

Note: New York State veterans with disabilities who currently hold a valid Access Pass may continue to use their pass for its duration. Prior to expiration, the passholder will need to submit their Lifetime Liberty application, VA documentation, a 2" x 2" picture and a copy of their valid NYS driver's license or non-driver ID. Individual Lifetime Liberty Pass. To apply for the Lifetime Liberty Pass, veterans should submit a Lifetime Liberty Pass Application, and indicate they are a Veteran using the Veterans Administration/Veterans Affairs certification. They will be issued their own distinctive Lifetime Liberty Pass.

Green Key Card

Card required to access automated/internet golf & camping reservation system. Identifies holder (except Non Resident card) as a Suffolk County resident and insures reduced fees for park activities.

Resident Green Key \$24.00; Sr. Citizen Green Key (60 and over) \$11.00; Handicap/Volunteer Fire/EMT Personnel/Auxiliary Police/CERT Green Key \$11.00; Jr. Green Key (17 yrs. and under) \$11.00

Replacement Green Key \$5.00

*Tourist Reservation Key (valid one year from purchase date) *Sold at W. Sayville Operations Office Only* \$40.00

Suffolk County Veterans Discount Card

This program provides Veterans discounts at local businesses. The discounts are determined by each business and their application need to be approved by Suffolk County Veterans Service Agency.

In order to obtain your Veteran discount, you will need a Suffolk County Residential Veteran ID card.

Mike remade my doors perfectly and no one was the

wiser regarding <u>my</u> work...he was gracious and amazing. He wanted nothing in return other than a little conversation. I did however retouch an early military photo of him...write an article for our newsletter about Mike the WWII Veteran entitled, "Air Force, But Not A Pilot", and at each meeting I would tell him about the new compliments my wife and I had received regarding the beautiful <u>Mike Bonchonsky Doors</u>.

For the almost 100 of us that recently attended the wonderful celebration of our retiring Post Commander Bob Santo, it was hard not be struck by the joyous mood of the event. There is no doubt the event itself was the catalyst, but table after table you saw people talking, exchanging, sharing and genuinely enjoying their time together...and hugging as they left.

So phrases like, "membership has its privilege" or "life's better when we're connected", have real meaning when someone asks, "What's in your wallet?" and you say, "My Post 1244 American Legion Card…Brother!"


THE COMMANDER'S CORNER


