Let's Take A Veteran Sailing 2017

Our partner SailAhead's 3rd annual "Lets Take a Veteran Sailing" event got off to a great start, with beautiful weather, and a decent wind at the Centerport Yacht Club.

The purpose of this annual event is to spread awareness of the PTSD problem and of Veteran suicide throughout the country. We also want to make the community aware of SailAhead's mission to use sailing as a healing platform to help Veterans with the physical and emotional consequences of war.

This year's event was dedicated to the memory of Ryan James Day, Army Ranger, who took his life on December 15, 2014 at the age of 21. Ryan's family and the families of several other victims were invited and attended this year's sailing as guests of SailAhead.

SailAhead has now taken on a new mission - honoring the family members left behind after a veteran suicide and recognizing the incredible sacrifice they have made.

The opening ceremony featured a Marine color guard and flag line by our American Legion Riders and the singing of the National Anthem and "God Bless America." SailAhead's 219 flag represents the 219 veterans who take their own life every ten days minus the one we hope to save. To help visualize what 219 veterans looks like, a rope having 219 knots was brought out on the field. Volunteers were asked to come forward and hold a knot on that rope. This was a very meaningful moment for all.

SailAhead carries the name tapes of 219 suicide victims on every mission in honor of their 219 "mates," actual veterans who took their own lives.

50 Sailboats plus several powerboats and a helicopter taking aerial photos were involved in this year's event. Over 300 participants, including 200 veterans and their guests, took part.

We concluded the three hour sailing with a BBQ courtesy of our host, the Centerport Yacht Club.

We had nine of the students attend our August meeting (the remaining eight will be at upcoming meetings). Each of them took a few minutes to tell us about their experiences at Boy's & Girl's State, what it meant to them, what they got out of it, and the friends they made.

In addition to learning more about how government works and running for various state, county, and city offices, they were exposed to many speakers from various government levels, such as, a state assemblyman, a college president, a congresswoman, a Marine Corps Colonel, a village mayor, a county legislator, a fire chief, a school superintendent, a county sheriff, and various other guest speakers.

We then presented them with Proclamations and Certificates of Merit from the Town of Huntington, Suffolk County and New York State.

We are looking forward to begin the process all over again for the 2018 year, and hope to be able to once again increase the number of qualified students we will be able to send to this "week that shapes a lifetime".

Americanism

The “I Am an America” Monument

Perhaps, in your travels, you have noticed the small, slightly askew, rustic flag pole on the front lawn of a private residence in Melville. At its base is a small granite monument, dedicated in 1947, with the inscription declaring that: “I Am an American Day Movement was organized here in May, 1938 by Helios Foundation, Inc.”

The monument and its American flag first caught my eye about ten years ago. I never gave it much thought, however, until the summer of 2012. I noticed that the flag was no longer serviceable and the pole was in danger of tipping over. Intrigued by the inscription on the monument, I set about to learn the history of the movement marked by the monument.



With the assistance of our Huntington Town Historian Robert Hughes, I learned that the first “I Am an American Day,” was originated by Mrs. Paul d’Otrengé Seghers in May of 1938 on what was then called Sunnyhill Farm.” Mrs. Seghers, a native of Poland, came to the United States in 1919. She had lost her husband, her only child and her fortune through the hands of the Communists. She found shelter and protection from persecution in the United States of America.

Grateful for the opportunities her new country provided her, she decided that her mission in life should be to propagate Americanism and show her appreciation to her flag and country for the privileges, opportunities and freedoms which she now enjoyed in her blessed land.

A year later, in 1939, New York City news tycoon William Randolph Hearst suggested the creation of a holiday to celebrate American Citizenship. Not only did Hearst have a wide readership of his many daily newspapers, but he had significant political connections. In 1940, Congress designated the third Sunday in May as “I am an American Day.” President Harry Truman presented the resolution, setting aside this date in honor of the American people, especially those who had recently become

citizens of the United States.

Despite the claims of Hearst, the local newspaper clippings I have on hand attest to the fact that the honor of creating the day belongs to Mrs. Seghers and the Town of Huntington.

The day was celebrated at Sunnyhill Farm with national and international dignitaries for twenty years from 1938 to 1957 at the house which still stands at 2500 New York Avenue. The monument was dedicated there on May 18, 1947.

In 1953 “I Am an American Day,” became “Citizenship Day” and is now celebrated alongside “Constitution Day” on September 17th of each year.



In 2012, we replaced the tattered flag with a new one and braced the old flag pole to prevent it from pitching over. Our post always has a supply of serviceable flags turned in at our mobile flag deposit box and, for the past five years, these have been helpful in keeping the flag pole supplied with flags. At one point, with help from Sgt. at Arms Charlie Armstrong, we gave it a new coat of paint, and installed a halyard and links to attach the flag. Last year, Commander Madden and I made some more repairs after the pole tipped over in a storm. We hope the repairs will last a while longer.

In 1957, Joseph W. Cermak, Supervisor of the Town of Huntington proclaimed May 19, 1957, as “I Am an American Day” in the Town of Huntington.

So, fellow Huntingtonians, go ahead and officially celebrate Huntington’s “I Am an American Day” on the third Sunday of May each year.

MIAP Activity Report

This past summer has been fairly quiet for the Missing In America Project. at Post 1244, due to a plethora of unrelated occurrences. However, unrelated as they may be, they still had an impact on MIAP's progress. This does not mean, however, that the M.I.A.P team's membership was not striving to advance the standing of our success in our mission. Unfortunately some of the issues led to confusion with in our ranks.

Clearing the air has led to partial success, but was time consuming in the process. Some one once said to me, "John don't let the perfect be the enemy of the good." Therefore, in this endeavor, our stalwart membership has pushed ahead in our mission. Our fantastic genealogist Ann Marie Martin, now lives in Florida, however, she still works with us. In that capacity, she has researched over 800 crematories and funeral homes in New York City and nearby counties. This is a prodigious and successful undertaking by our Ann Marie.

We are carrying on the mission in New York by creating 200 flyers to be sent to those institutions. They will be mailed to crematoriums those targeted boroughs

and counties by our supportive Post 1244, without which we would be hampered in our progress. If we do not hear from them in an appropriate time, we will then follow up with a phone call. These calls will be made by our MIAP team.

With due diligence we shall endeavor to stay the course. Our optimism is based on the sheer numbers we are targeting. We shall continue northward in New York State until the Royal Canadian Mounties stop us.

Our work with the New York City Department of Veterans Services is resuming after a prolonged delay.

On September 21st at 1:30 pm, we will provide honors to an unclaimed U.S. Army veteran, Mr. Howard Johnson, at Calverton National Cemetery. All are welcome to attend and pay their respects.

The Gold Star - A Symbol of Honor

American Gold Star families are immediate relatives of members of the U.S. Armed Forces who have been killed in combat or in support of certain military activities.

The U.S. Department of Defense issues Gold Star Lapel Buttons to immediate family members of a fallen member of the military killed in the line of duty. The department also issues the Next of Kin of Deceased Personnel Lapel Pin for family members of those who die on active duty, although not in combat.

Some families display flags with a gold star emblem, indicating a family member has been killed in a military operation. A flag with two gold stars, for example, shows two service members from a particular family were killed.

Some families choose to display the banners, also known as service flags, throughout the year as a solemn tribute to their fallen family members. The rectangular flags are white, bordered in red, with a gold star overlapping a larger blue star.

The Gold Star first appeared on flags in 1918, when families would pin a gold star over the blue service star hanging in their window to indicate that their loved one had been killed overseas. At that time President Wilson also authorized mothers to wear a gilt gold star on the traditional black mourning arm band to signify they lost a child in the war.



The Gold Star Lapel Pin.

Designed and created in 1947 to be presented to eligible surviving family members of service members who died while deployed in support of Overseas Contingency Operations, or who died from wounds sustained in theater (Public Law 80-306). The Gold Star lapel pin consists of a gold star on a field of purple surrounded by laurel leaves.



Next of Kin of Deceased Personnel Lapel Pin.

Consists of a gold star on a gold background surrounded by four oak sprigs. It was approved in 1973 for the primary next of kin of service members who lose their lives while serving on active duty or while assigned in a Reserve or National Guard unit in a drill status, and is authorized for issue retroactive to March 29, 1973. The widow or widower, each parent, each child, stepchild, child through adoption, brother, half-brother, sister, and half-sister are entitled to receive and wear these pins in recognition of their loss and the sacrifice of their loved one.



The Gold Star Service Banner

Some families display flags with a gold star emblem, indicating a family member has died while in the military. A flag with two gold stars, for example, shows two service members from a particular family died.

The rectangular flags are white, bordered in red, sometimes with a gold star overlapping a larger blue star. The flags were initially flown by families during World War I between 1914 and 1918.

In a proclamation issued September 24, 2015, President Obama said that most Americans can't fully comprehend the price Gold Star family members have paid: "Their sleepless nights allow for our peaceful rest, and the folded flags they hold dear are what enable ours to wave. The depth of their sorrow is immeasurable, and we are forever indebted to them for all they have given us."

Customs and Courtesies

The Legion Cap



The left side (emblem side) of the cap is reserved only for the Legion emblem, city, county, district, or state lettering.

If desired, the following items may be placed on the right side of the cap:

- a) Additional lettering, restricted to either the name of a post or to an officer title, such as Past Commander.
- b) Cap insignias or badges for past or present officers.
- c) Consecutive membership insignia, membership stars, and/or other Legion or military service decorations.

The Legion cap should be neat and orderly in its appearance.

The Legion uniform cap should be worn by its members only when in attendance at official Legion meetings or ceremonies or as official guests at patriotic or other civil functions or by individuals when officially representing The American Legion on public occasions.

A member is considered to be in uniform if wearing an official Legion uniform cap. Therefore it is not proper to wear the cap while eating a meal at an official Legion or civic luncheon or dinner.

The cap should be worn in a place of worship only by the Guard of Honor, Color Guard, and Commander of same while in marching order or standing guard. When

The American Legion, like the military in which we all served, instills pride in its members because of its history, mission and the respect it has earned in service to the community, state and nation.

A reflection of that pride is visible in the customs, courtesies and traditions we hold dear. Adherence to them connects us with all American Legionnaires, past and present.

returned to and seated in pews, the cap should be removed.

Legion posts marching in formation into a place of worship should uncover at the door, hold the cap with the right hand over the heart until the arrival in the pews and commanded to take seats, remaining uncovered during the entire service. At the close of the service, upon command, the post shall arise, the members holding the cap with the right hand over the heart will march out of the place of worship and recover after marching through the door.

Legion members not in formation will uncover upon entering the place of worship and remain uncovered during the entire service and will recover after leaving the place of worship.

When at a funeral, the cap should be held over the heart as one approaches the casket and is not at any time worn in a place of worship (except by the Guard of Honor, Color Guard, or Commander of same while in marching order or standing guard.) At the graveside, the cap should be held in the right hand over the heart during the entire service. In cold and inclement weather, the cap should not be worn.

In Legion meetings, the cap should be worn except during moments of the Pledge of Allegiance, prayer, and when standing in silent reverence in memory of departed comrades, when the cap should be held with the right hand over the heart.

Female members of the Legion should wear their caps in the manner prescribed for female personnel of the armed services.



Do You Have Your Discharge Document?

Legionnaires, I was contacted last week by a friend who has a friend whose father just passed away. He is a veteran, having fought in WW II. His wish was to be buried in a military cemetery with honors. On mentioning this to the Funeral Director while making his arrangements, they were asked for his DD 214 or his Military Discharge Papers because he was from WW II, in order to facilitate such a request. Of course, they didn't have it ... had never seen it and had no idea where to look for it.

Unfortunately, at this late time, there is no easy, expedient way to procure a copy to enable a burial in a military cemetery. Long story short, they hadn't planned on anything but a military cemetery so now they had to rush out and buy a plot in a private cemetery to bury their dear father.

Veterans to be Eligible to Use Post / Base Exchange Online

The Department of Defense has announced a policy change that will extend limited online military exchange shopping privileges to all honorably discharged veterans of the military. The new benefit will apply only to online shopping at the exchanges, not at brick-and-mortar stores. Purchases are free of state sales taxes.

The veterans online shopping benefit will be effective as of this coming Veterans Day, November 11. While shopping privileges exclude the purchase of uniforms, alcohol and tobacco products, it includes the Exchange Services' dynamic online retail environment known so well to service members and their families. This policy change follows careful analysis, coordination and strong public support.

More than 165,000 honorably discharged veterans

have been verified since June to receive the new veterans online shopping benefit. VetVerify.org is the first step in the eligibility process. Veterans who register through VetVerify.org will receive notification of their acceptance as eligible online shoppers, or, if their records are incomplete, will receive guidance on the steps they must take to update those record.

Part of the profit from the sales at exchanges goes to support morale, welfare and recreation programs at military installations and to improve brick-and-mortar stores.

Operation Paperback

Operation Paperback is a non-profit organization that collects gently used paperback books nationwide and sends them to American troops overseas, as well as veterans and military families here at home. Since 1999, they have shipped over 1.9 million books to locations around the globe.

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
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
